William Hindman had the script (by John de Groot), the Director (Philip Church) and his own rare talent to construct the breathing image of the perplexing, magnetic genius, Ernest Hemingway. He did it with easy style, fascinating comprehension and skilled mastery of his acting craft.

Hindman wasn't just "playing" Hemingway. Hemingway gallop ed through the actor with all his brilliance, passions, foibles, sins and ironic humor. At the end of this two hour tour-deforce, one man show, the audience realized that it had been given the opportunity to experience not only the tormented prize-winning author, but an incredible interpretation by the actor.

De Groot's technique of treating the audience as a specially favored visitor in Hemingway's home, Finca Vigia in Havana, Cuba, was wonderfully successful. We were guests before whom Hemingway could unburden himself freely about his driving ambition, pursuing ghosts, unbounded drinking, innermost furies and violence and fears of the dark --- all presented with a salty, ironic banter that barely masked his pain. Dorothy Hindman's subtle music and sound effects punctuated and underlined all the changing moods.

Mr. Papa had so much to say in his lifetime, and sadly, probably so much still left unsaid.

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
